What would you say to someone who is thinking of volunteering?

Why did you decide to volunteer with refugees?

One of the many reasons that I volunteer with refugees is that my grandmother and most of my great-grandparents arrived in this country as refugees from Europe in the early part of the 20th century. When they arrived, they had help from other refugees who had come before them, and also from HIAS, so I am especially happy to be helping HIAS here in Austin, and paying it forward.

How did you find AJPR?

A friend and fellow congregant at Congregation Kol Halev, Susan Pintchovski, introduced me to AJPR. She knew of my interest in Tikkun Olam in general, and helping with refugees in particular, from work that we had done together with other congregants, dating back to the Syrian Refugee crisis.

How has your help these past couple of months impacted refugee lives?

I have mostly been helping with apartment set-ups, including furniture donation collections, and I have also done some individual missions, taking refugees to doctor's appointments etc. I have also been involved in creating connections between Austin Community College, where I work as a philosophy Professor, and the services that ACC has to offer refugees, such as English classes and assistance with job searches, as well as regular college courses and courses to earn vocational certificates. I hope that all of these things help refugees find their feet and get established in their new lives here in the USA.

How has it impacted your life?

Volunteering with refugees has impacted my life by reminding me that what I do matters. My late mother brought me up to feel that helping others is the most important thing there is, and she lived by that teaching. So now, I feel that I am continuing an important family legacy, as well as manifesting the Jewish value of Tikkun Olam (Repairing the World).

If you are not already volunteering, take that first step even if you think that you are too busy. It turns out that when you commit to helping others, the time and other resources that you need seem to magically show up, and the feeling that you are making a difference is priceless!



It is with great sadness that we announce **the passing of James and Patrick Kantamutuzo**, newly arrived refugees from Congo. They died in a fatal car accident with another vehicle on Saturday Nov 4. Patrick was 19 years old and working on getting his HS diploma. James was a 15 years old high school student. Catholic Charities, UT, AISD, and the Congolese community are making arrangements for the family and supporting them during this tragic time. Someone is always there to check on them. Someone has arranged for pro- bono legal assistance. The funeral and memorial were held on Nov 10. Our hearts go out to their father Pacifique, sister, older and younger brothers as well as their friends and families in the Congolese community.
